

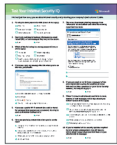
How to use this Toolkit

Elements can be used individually or in combination. For the very briefest training, for example, you could watch the video in a team meeting. For a bit more depth and staying power, you might print and distribute the **Top Tips for Internet Security at Work** card for employees to post at their desks. (If you need them, there are **printing instructions** for the tip card and the poster.)

Or, take this more comprehensive approach, which includes a presentation:



- > Post the **Stay Sharp on Internet Safety at Work video** on a shared team website. Then, send the shared link in email as an attention-grabber to announce the presentation event.



- > Give the quiz, **Test Your Internet Security IQ**, before the presentation. Employees could complete it at their desks or at the outset of the event. You can decide when to distribute or recap the answers.



- > Promote the presentation, **Internet Security at Work**, with the poster, **Internet Security Begins with You**. You can fill in the details of date, time, and location.



- > Give the presentation, distributing the “Top Tips” card at the end.
- > After the presentation, send email asking for feedback and attach the quiz (and answers), so employees can check what they’ve learned.
